Talia Goldenberg and her parents were unable to convince Talia's doctors, nurses and support staff to take her difficulty breathing seriously. After a botched code, Talia was left in a permanent vegetative state. Ten days later she was removed from life support and allowed to die.

Her parents Jeff Goldenberg, MD, and Naomi Kirtner, MA, founded Talia's Voice: Projects for Patient Safety to change the culture in medicine so that nobody else's child dies because the people in charge won't listen.




#### Catholic Bioethics and Conscientious Objection Implementing Catholic Directives within Secular Healthcare


**Power, Place and Health New Podcast Draws Connections**

### Rural Public Health Ethics Making the Case for Medicaid Expansion

Why have we socially and politically failed to address the most pressing public health issues of our time? There is no one answer, but there are new ways to think about this question. For example, why has Medicaid expansion not happened in ten states, including Kansas, most of which is rural?

Nellie Kassebaum, the Center's research coordinator, explores the issues affecting rural healthcare in general and Kansas in particular and how using a public health ethics framework that addresses our health as a collective can help us respond to public health issues of the day, including high levels of preventable sickness and premature death. One way to do that, she says, is by expanding Medicaid.

## Missouri Recognizes TPOPP/POLST as Equivalent to Missouri Out of Hospital Do Not Resuscitate Order

The Center for Practical Bioethics has served as sponsoring organization of the TPOPP/POLST initiative in Kansas and Missouri since 2008.

On July 6, 2023, Missouri Governor Parson signed SB45 and HB 402 recognizing the TPOPP/POLST medical order set as equivalent to the state's Out of Hospital Do Not Resuscitate Order (OHDNR).

The legislation, which will go into effect on August 28, 2023, addresses both adults and pediatric populations. It will allow individuals and their physician providers to execute a more comprehensive set of medical orders for persons living with advanced illness and medical frailty who wish to detail specific treatments that they do or do not want and to share those across settings.

As a result of the recognition, new training is under development and will be made available statewide in Missouri to providers in all settings within the next few months. Special programs will target hospital, long-term care, EMS, home healthcare and hospice.
