Federal Bureaucracy

Changes are profound and "irrecoverable"

Example: Administration for Community Living (ACL)

- "Tiny" federal agency of ~100 employees.
- Parts and pieces moved, but fully dismantled
- Spending is the focus over what the government buys
- Difficult to perceive opportunity to align with fast and inconsistent changes
 - Focus on chronic disease, but ACL is dismantled.
 - What are the needs that will now not be met?







Closer to home

Example: Mid-America Regional Council, USAging Center of Excellence

- Center holds a 2-year, \$10,000 agreement (June 2024 May 2026)
- A MARC staff member stated that USAging requested that all grantees **change language in the grant goals and objectives** to comply with Executive Order 14151 (no DEI in government).
- No administrative agency ACL is dismantled.

Will nonprofit sector remain?

- Urban Institute* estimates 29% of sector funding from government grants/contracts
