### Justice in the Age of Misinformation: Why Bioethics Must Defend the Independence of Science

In the October Dispatch, we explore the impact of misinformation on justice in health and healthcare. Cassie argues that open-access publishing has created a market for **predatory journals** that charge for publication without meaningful peer review, leaving the public to sort out truth from noise, and that **political interference** causes communities to lose the chance to benefit from research most relevant to their lives.

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## Clinical Ethics Corner Video Case Study

### What Does It Mean to Be an Expert? Perception, Reality and Practical Implications

What does it mean to be an expert? What does it take? And when does someone's expertise become beneficial to others?

Ryan Pferdehirt, D.Bioethics, HEC-C, thinks about these ideas, particularly in today's world, as he works as a professional ethicist. He wonders: do I understand morality more than others, and if so, what is my role to others as an expert? These thoughts remind him of a patient encounter he had a few years back involving an 84-year-old female actively dying whose son believed removing the ventilator would be murder.

The case illustrates how bioethics expertise enabled the son to feel understood and supported in allowing his mother to pass.

Clinicians, case managers and caregivers can find it challenging when seeking to avoid interventions that are medically futile while also respecting patient autonomy and family wishes.

When they gathered on October 8 in Kansas City for the American Case Management Association's 20<sup>th</sup> annual Case Management and Transitions of Care Conference/Missouri-Kansas Chapter, they asked Ryan Pferdehirt to present the keynote address on that topic.

Ryan's presentation – *Decision Making in Healthcare: Medical Ineffective Therapy* – included examples how to navigate futility and resolve issues, balancing the principles of beneficence, non-maleficence, and respect for patient autonomy.
